THE REASON FOR THE SEASON

The Christmas Gospel (Luke 2:1-14 used at Midnight Mass) must be one of the world's best-known stories. Stripped of the sentimental additions it has acquired over the years, it tells a story of hardship and uncertainty, yet it holds out a message of hope. A homeless young couple, far from their families and friends, give birth to their first child in the corner of a stable shared with domestic animals. The baby's first visitors are not adoring grandparents or aunts and uncles, but some curious shepherds whose night watch had been disturbed by angels telling them to go in search of a newborn child in the town of Bethlehem. In the animals' food trough lies a child, wrapped tightly in bands of cloth, the baby clothes of the poor. The shepherds have been told that this child was the new King David, Israel's legendary hero who had been anointed as King of Israel in this very town a thousand years before. Despite the promises made to him by God, David's royal line appeared to have petered out, as Israel became a colony, now of one superpower, now of another. ■

LEARN

The great truth of Christmas is that in a frail child, God has taken on our humanity.

The other side of that mystery is that Christ shares his divine being with us.

The prayer the priest says as he puts the drop of water into the chalice (see below) is a reminder of this mystery.

DO

Visit the crib in a church this week and allow your imagination to recreate the scene.



SAY

By the mystery of this water and wine, may we come to share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity.

REFLECT

Christmas is a time for poetry and song. One of the best-known English Christmas poems was written by a poet called John Betjeman. It begins as a light-hearted, and even slightly mocking account of Christmas most of us will recognise from experience. Gift-giving at Christmas has become so compulsory that surly teenagers spend their cash on gifts, even if they are just "bath salts and inexpensive scents and hideous tie (so kindly meant)". Betjeman is a believer. In all the gift-giving and good spirits of the season, he wonders, has the most important gift of all been forgotten:

*And is it true, and is it true,
This most tremendous tale of all,
Seen in a stained glass window's hue,
A baby in an ox's stall?*

He knows that the child in the manger went on to become the Saviour of humanity. His presence in our story was not confined to a poor down-trodden land for a few decades at the beginning of the first century of our era, but "God was man in Palestine, and lives today in bread and wine."

The old English name for today's feast was originally two words – Christ Mass – the Mass at which we celebrated the birth of Christ. The Mass is integral to the celebration of today's feast. Apart from All Souls, it is the only feast that has three distinct Masses celebrated at different times during the day, from midnight until midday.

One of the finest sermons in history was preached at midnight Mass in Rome one Christmas in the middle of the fifth century by Pope St Leo the Great. All these years later, it still catches something of the great mystery of Christmas. "Christian, acknowledge your dignity, and becoming a sharer in God's nature. Do not go back to an old way of life. Remember who is the Head of the Body of which you are a member. Remember that you were rescued from the power of darkness and brought out into God's light and kingdom. By the mystery of baptism you became the temple of the Holy Ghost: do not put such a guest to flight by sinful acts, or make yourself once more a slave of the devil. You were purchased by the blood of Christ. He will judge you in truth, the one who ransomed you in mercy." ■
